Approximately 127 million people live in this island country, in an area roughly equal to that of California. Japan is the world's second—largest economy and has a constitutional monarchy with the world's oldest imperial line, numbering 125 successive rulers.

Perched on the Ring of Fire, Japan is a cluster of four main islands – Hokkaido, Honshu, Shikoku and Kyushu – and thousands of smaller ones. Most of the country is covered in mountains, 70 of which are active volcanoes. Japan a very densely populated country. There are two versions of Japan's early history – one of the Shinto mythologists and another of the historians. According to tradition, the country was founded in 660 B.C. by Jimmu, a descendant of the sun goddess. Jimmu is believed to have been an ancestor of future emperors.

Historians, however, think Homo sapiens inhabited the islands about 30,000 years ago, having migrated from Southeast Asia. By A.D. 500 the Yamato, a political body consisting of powerful clans headed by priest-chiefs, had established control over most of Japan.

DAY 03 TOKYO

Meals included: Breakfast 🚻



At 9:00 AM meet your guide in the lobby of the Four Seasons in preparation for a full day Tokyo city tour.

Tokyo, originally 'Edo' has been the capital of Japan since 1600 AD. After 250 years of isolation from the rest of the world, Tokyo began to open its doors in the late 19th century. Tokyo's current cityscape is the result of the rebuilding that occurred after extensive bombing during World War II destroyed much of the city. While old and new coexist harmoniously, Tokyo has come to symbolize the modern Japan, manifesting economic prosperity and worldly sophistication.

Visit the grounds of the Imperial Palace, formerly the Edo Castle. It doesn't matter how busy Tokyo is, you will always enjoy the calm tranquility of the Imperial Gardens. From the Gardens, you will not be able to see the Imperial Palace; it is hidden behind walls and very heavily guarded. The palace itself is closed to the public, but you will be able to explore the castle walls and view the moats thick with greenery. When the Emperor of Japan is not traveling, he lives in this house.

Stroll through the lovely wooded grounds of Meiji Shrine. The Shrine was built in 1920 to deify the emperor and empress of the Meiji period (1912). It is unusual to find separate shrines for an emperor and his empress, but Emperor Meiji made such a strong impression on his people that the Japanese constructed the shrine just after his death. Destroyed in WWII, it has been rebuilt with dignity, unlike most postwar construction in Japan.

Visit Harajuku. Walk along Takeshita-dori Street, one of Tokyo's most fashionable neighborhoods. Casual shops for young generations line Takeshita Street near Harajuku Station, and beautiful and sophisticated shops and restaurants fill Omotesnado Street. This area is certainly the place for people watching and a district where Tokyo's thriving youth/pop culture pulses. This area is most famous for alternative apparel for teenager and is considered the Champs Elysees of Tokyo. It is a great place to for shopping and the latest trends in fashion.

Visit Roppongi, a section of Tokyo once famous for its nightlife, is now respectable again thanks to the Roppongi Hills, a massive shopping and dining complex. Roppongi Hills, which opened in April 2003, is Japan's most significant private urban development project. It incorporates modern architecture with pre-existing traditional features, including a Japanese garden, a Buddhist temple, and a children's park. Called the 'Rockefeller Center of Tokyo', Roppongi Hills sits on a 28-acre site that includes the Mori Tower, the Asahi Broadcasting Center, Virgin Cinemas, more than 200 retails shops and restaurants and residential towers that can house more than 840 families.

Return to the hotel at approximately 5:00 PM.

DAY 04 TOKYO

This morning observe the traditional city design of Asakusa. Centered around Asakusa Kannon Temple (Sensoji Temple) with a history of 1,400 years, the Asakusa district represents Tokyo's old downtown, steeped in the nostalgic atmosphere of Edo-period while retaining a variety of traditional arts and crafts.


Visit the Edo Tokyo Museum. This museum houses various displays that illustrate the history, lifestyle, and culture of Tokyo, including the Edo period (1603-1867). A permanent exhibit hall covers roughly 400 years of history, depicting major events in Tokyo's history throughout this period in the form of actual objects, reproductions, and replica models.

Continue to Akihabara, also known as "Akihabara Electric Town". Akihabara is a lively district known as a major shopping area for electronic, computer, cameras, and just about any other electronic product there is. As night falls, Akihabara comes alive with a dazzling show of color and lights.

Visit the Ginza District a world-famous shopping district located in the center of Tokyo. Boasting wide avenues and elegant stores, this was the first place in Japan to import Western-style cultures in earnest, introducing the nation to sophisticated store displays and the joys of window shopping.

Return to the hotel at approximately **5:00 PM**.

The Regent Hotel, located in the core of the historic quarter, is a Beijing landmark offering guests unrivaled comfort in a relaxed and sophisticated atmosphere. Hotel amenities include 25 meter Indoor pool, Wellness Spa, and state-of-the-art fitness center.

Beijing reigns both as an ancient capital of Imperial China and as the capital of present-day China. Beijing is at once the nation's political, economic, and cultural center. It is a city in motion with the drama of history in its streets. The future course of the world reverberates here while magnificently preserved palaces, tombs and temples stands as testaments to the past.

Modern Beijing lies on the site of countless human settlements which date back half a million years. The name Beijing is by Chinese standards a modern term. It dates back to the 15th century, when the Ming emperor, Yongle, planned and built the city in its present form. One of the city's earlier names was the City of Swallows (Yanjing), a name given in the Liao Dynasty (947-1125). The name is still appropriate, for in a land where few birds are seen in cities except in cages, Beijing boasts a large summer community of swallows, which make their homes in the capacious eaves of the ancient wooden buildings. At twilight, Qianmen Gate, which stands on the south side of Tiananmen Square, is circled by roosting swallows.





DAY 06 BEIJING

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch



At 9:00 AM be ready in the lobby of the Regent Hotel in preparation for a full day of exploring Beijing and the surrounding area.

Walk into Tiananmen Square and imagine the great historic events of the 20th century that took place here. The memory of Mao Tse-Tung dominates the square as his enormous portrait hangs above the "Gate of Heavenly Peace." Behind these walls, the Forbidden City looms. Step inside and tour the palace where China's emperors ruled in absolute isolation.

The Forbidden City (The Palace Museum) is an architectural masterpiece. It is a 250-acre complex and was home to 24 emperors in the Ming and Qing dynasties, from 1402 to 1911. It is the largest existing ancient architectural structure in China today.

Now transformed into a huge museum, it houses an enormous collection of precious cultural relics and art objects, including jewels, antiques, and paintings.

Travel by old-fashioned rickshaw through the narrow streets (Hutongs). Visit the old quadrangles and meet with a local family living in the district. Learn about the daily life of ordinary Beijing residents.

Pause for a photo stop at the Beijing National Stadium, also known as the "Bird's Nest" and the National Aquatics Center, known as the "Water Cube". These sites were the main venues for the 2008 Summer Olympics.







DAY 07 BEIJING

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch 🚯




At 8:30 AM be ready in the lobby of the Regent Hotel in preparation for a full-day of exploring.

Visit the Mutianyu section of the extraordinary 2000 - year-old Great Wall of China, one of the most spectacular structures ever built by man. The wall snakes its way from east to west for nearly 4,000 miles. The Great Wall was built and rebuilt by a succession of Chinese emperors to keep out the marauding hordes of nomads who from time to time swept into China - in much the same way as the wind from the Gobi still sweeps in seasonal sand storms which suffocate the city.

Enjoy a cable car ride to the peak where you will have spectacular views of the area. You will also have time to climb the wall at your own pace.









DAY 08 BEIJING/SHANGHAI

Meals included: Breakfast 🚯



This morning visit the Temple of Heaven, a group of temples and altars set in a large park. Among the buildings is one of China's most beautiful architectural gems.

Afterwards transfer to the Beijing airport.



1:35 PM Depart Beijing via China Eastern Air flight # 5140 direct service to Shanghai. Total flying time: 2 hours.

3:35 PM Arrive Shanghai. After collecting luggage, you will be met by your guide outside the baggage claim area and escorted to a waiting vehicle for your transfer to the Peninsula Hotel.

At the Peninsula Shanghai, reservations for a Deluxe Room have been confirmed for the following 3 nights.

The Peninsula Shanghai fronts the historic Bund, with views of the Bund, Huangpu River, Pudong, former British Consulate Gardens and blends with the historic architecture of its landmark neighbors along the Bund – a UNESCO dedicated Modern Heritage Site.

DAY 09 SHANGHAI

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch



At **9:00 AM** be ready in the lobby of the Peninsula Hotel in preparation for a full day of exploring.

Explore the Shanghai Bund which has dozens of historical buildings from the 1920s and 1930s. The Bund is adjacent to the Huangpu River. The buildings once housed numerous banks and trading houses from all over the world. The Bund lies north of the old, walled city and was initially a British settlement.

In this area you will find a maze of alleys and narrow streets, densely populated and always full of activity. The neighborhood evokes an earlier time in China's history, a time before high- rises and high tech. Here specialty shops sell tea, trinkets, and everything in between.

Continue to the Yu Yuan Gardens, which typify the traditional Chinese sense of beauty and symbolism. The gardens were created in the 16th century by a young Ming official in an attempt to please his father. Only five acres in size, it is a miniature wild landscape of unusual rocks, still pools, streams, pavilions, and winding footpaths.

Visit the Shanghai Museum, famous for its ancient Chinese art as well as collections of bronze, ceramics, painting and calligraphy. The Museum's collection is displayed over five floors, covering a total area of over 420,000 sq. ft. The building itself is designed in the shape of an ancient bronze cooking vessel called a ding. The building has a round top and a square base, symbolizing the ancient Chinese perception of the world as "round sky, square earth".

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant.

This afternoon visit the spectacularly illuminated Bund Sightseeing Tunnel, which runs underneath the Huangpu River. Complete with cable cars and a colorful light show, the tunnel (which is over 2,000 feet in length) connects downtown Shanghai to the Pudong New Area and the Oriental Pearl TV Tower.

This urban special effect provides an excellent opportunity for visitors to encounter a marvelous excursion underwater and a rather enjoyable and efficient way to travel between Pudong and Puxi.

Also visit the Oriental Pearl Tower for a panoramic view of the city. The tower also serves as the air control tower for the Dan Dare airport.

This evening a **6:30 PM** dinner reservation will be made at Mr. & Mrs. Bund. Transfers to/from the restaurant have not been included.

DAY 10 SHANGHAI

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch 🚯



At 9:00 AM be ready in the lobby of the Peninsula Hotel in preparation for a day of exploring.

Explore Zhujiajiao, an ancient water town with a history of more than 1700 years. Quaint and serene, Zhujiajiao is laced with flowing water.

Covering an area of 47 square kilometers, the little fan-shaped town glimmers like a bright pearl in the landscape of lakes and mountains. Endowed with another elegant name - 'Pearl Stream', Zhujiajiao is the bestpreserved among the four ancient towns in Shanghai. You will see unique old bridges spanning bubbling streams, small rivers shaded by willow trees, and houses with picturesque courtyards. In this water village, locals live on waterways, still doing everyday activities from washing clothes to shopping from vendors in boats.



Fangsheng Bridge (Setting-fish-free Bridge) is the longest, largest and tallest stone bridge, with five openings both in Zhujiajiao and in the Shanghai region. This bridge was built in 1571. On the bridge stands a stone tablet named Dragon Gate Stone, which is engraved with 8 coiling dragons encircling a shining pearl. On top of the bridge are 4 lifelike stone lions. Lang Bridge (Veranda Bridge), also named Huimin Bridge, is the only wooden bridge and the most featured span in this town. It has wooden bars on the two sides and upturned eaves about, just like a narrow corridor. Explore Ancient Streets filled with ancient buildings from the Ming and Qing Dynasties.

Take a short cruise of Zhujiajiao's ancient canals then pause for lunch at a local restaurant.

Afterwards return to Shanghai and visit the Urban Planning Exhibition Center, one of the world's largest showcases of urban development. A highlight is the model of urban Shanghai as it will look in 2020.

Visit the Xintiandi district. As a car-free shopping, eating and entertainment area of Shanghai, Xintiandi is composed of an area of restored traditional shikumen ("stone gate") houses on narrow alleys, a modern shopping mall with a cinema complex, and some adjoining houses which now serve as book stores, cafes and restaurants.

Xintiandi covers two city blocks in the French Concession district of Shanghai, an area that was originally developed in the 1920s during Shanghai's colonial period when the city was a cosmopolitan, louche trading port. The French Concession is distinguished by tree-lined streets of two-story, gray-brick houses that have stone arches for doorways and terra-cotta tile roofs. Narrow alleyways intersect the streets, giving passage from one to the next. After 1949, the buildings in the French Concession were turned into communal dwellings, with as many as 10 families living in a house intended for one, and the area became known for overcrowding and poor sanitation.

Enjoy an acrobatic performance by the Shanghai Acrobatic Troupe at the Shanghai Center. These performers have earned a worldwide reputation for their outstanding talent. The performance lasts from **7:15 PM – 9:00 PM**. Return to the Shanghai Peninsula at approximately **9:15 PM**.

Hong Kong has become a world-class city by fusing Chinese traditional with Western customs. At its foundation, quite literally, is the ancient art of fung shui, the belief in luck provided by the elements of wind (fung) and water (shui). Neither village houses nor the landmark Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank headquarters gets built without approval from a fung shui master.

Religion also influences everyday life. The city is dotted with temple - bright and dazzling structures like the one at Wong Tai Sin, as well as small personal shrines laden with incense and offerings.

DAY 12 HONG KONG

Meals included: Breakfast



At 9:30 AM depart the hotel for a day of exploring.

Travel across Victoria Harbour onboard the iconic Star Ferry. Disembark at Central and walk to the base of Victoria Peak.

Board the funicular train, or Peak Tram, to the Victoria Peak for spectacular views of Hong Kong and the New Territories.

Enjoy a 90 minute hike (2 ¼ mile) Peak Circle Walk. Begin at Lugard Road, named after Hong Kong's 14th governor, Sir Fredrick Lugard.

At Aberdeen, ride in a sampan for an up-close look at the brightly decorated trawlers which double as floating homes for Aberdeen's fishermen and their families. This sheltered harbor is surrounded by hillsides decked with woodlands, Chinese cemeteries and residential towers.

Pause for lunch at a local restaurant. Cost of lunch payable directly to the restaurant.

Visit Man Mo Temple, at the corner of Hollywood Road and Ladder Streets (an aptly named street, where the wealthy used to be carried up the steeply rising stone staircase in sedan chairs). The Man Mo Temple was named for two principal deities, 'man', the god of literature, holding a calligraphy brush, and

'mo' the god of war, distinguished by his green robe and long sword. The interior of the temple is adorned with many fine, well-polished brass and pewter incense burners and houses the heavily carved wooden chairs on which the images of the gods were carried in procession.

From the ceiling hang immense incense spirals, which burn for as long as three weeks, carrying fragrant petitions for health, wealth and happiness.

Stroll along nearby Hollywood Road and you'll soon discover Hong Kong's "SoHo", the area "South of Hollywood Road". It offers a wide range of upmarket international restaurants and bars along Staunton Street, Elgin Street and Shelley Street. Jump on what Guinness World Records calls the world's longest covered escalator and experience the cosmopolitan atmosphere of this popular food district.

Explore Sheung Wan District. Hong Kong's most typical and traditional 'Chinatown', Sheung Wan District offers a hive of wharves and shop houses, exotic markets and steep 'ladder' lanes. While strolling around the market, stop to look around the fascinating Sheung Wan Dried Food and Herbal Medicine Market.

Late this afternoon return to the InterContinental Hong Kong.

This lends a thrilling sense of discovery to one's sightseeing and adds an element of surprise when exploring what is the Orient's most fabled city.

1:55 PM Arrive Bangkok, Thailand - one of the most "Oriental" cities in the Asean World. Formerly the fabled Kingdom of Siam, Thailand earns its reputation as "the Land of Smiles".

After completing immigration formalities and collecting your luggage you will be met by your guide and escorted to a waiting vehicle for your transfer to the Siam Hotel. Your guide will be holding a sign marked 'Your Name'.


At the Siam, reservations for a Siam Suite have been confirmed for the following 3 nights.

The Siam is located on the Bangkok side of the Chao Praya River, at the base of Krung Thon Bridge in historic Dusit district. Set on 3 acres of premium river frontage, the privately owned and operated 39-room luxury retreat will transport you to a bygone serenity suffused with priceless antiquities, oriental allure and contemporary comforts.

Good restaurants in Bangkok include the Mandarin Oriental's Sala Rim Naam (riverside restaurant that features a set Thai Dinner and Thai Classical Dance Performance), The Dome at Le Bua Hotel (State Towers), Sirocco Rooftop Restaurant or one of the Mandarin Oriental Hotels fine restaurants – Le Normandie, China Club or Lord Jim's.

Marvel at the mysterious Wat Phra Keo (Emerald Buddha), the most revered Buddha image in Thailand. The exquisite temple contains an image of Buddha carved from a single piece of jade.

Board a long-tail boat and travel along the Chao Phraya River. Observe the Thai lifestyle – the contrast between luxurious condominiums and ruined houses along both sides of the River.

Visit the Royal Barge Museum which houses ceremonial King's barges decorated with multi-color glass, gilt and stucco.

Visit Wat Arun, 'Temple of Dawn'. This monumental 86-meter Khmer-style prang, one of the largest religious monuments in the country, towers above the Chao Phraya to form Bangkok's most impressive and famous landmark. Wat Arun symbolically represents the Buddhist universe, with its trident-capped central tower indicating Mount Meru and the four smaller towers depicting the four worldly oceans. Reflective beauty comes from thousands of multi-glazed Chinese porcelains embedded into the structure by Buddhist devotees.

Overnight: The Siam - Siam Suite





is Thailand's most authentic floating market.

Afterwards visit the Railway market, a unique attraction because of the fact that a train literally runs through the market 8 times a day. It is a fascinating sight watching the market vendors selling their goods laid out on both of the railway tracks and then suddenly removing them as each train passes--and then placing all of their items back as they were before.

Return to the Siam Hotel and enjoy a leisurely afternoon.


